

Policy Review...

Governance documents have been drafted and are undergoing review processes. An update will be provided to Society members this Spring.

Religion & Family Life Curricula Review Focus Committee

This Committee has been tasked to review and recommend a common Religion and Family Life curricula and resources for the consideration of the Bishop of Kamloops and the CISKD Board of Directors.

The Committee is composed of clergy, principals and teachers. They have met on several occasions to review available curriculum, programs and resources that currently exist within and beyond our schools. The Bishop of Kamloops and CISKD Board of Directors are anticipating this Committee's suggested recommendations for consideration in the near future. A decision is anticipated to be made by the end of this school year for fall implementation at all CISKD schools.

LIVING THE DOMESTIC CHURCH: CREATING A HOME ALTAR 101

Creating an Altar in your home is easier than you think! It's simple to do, no rules, and is a great way to set the path for the Domestic Church in your home!

Start with a Surface - a mantle, desk, table, top of the piano, shelf on the wall, a bookshelf, an area of your china cabinet - anything that works for you and can be a practical gathering space for prayer. It doesn't have to be perfect and you can always move it later.

Gather a Selection of Religious Items - Gather items you may already have: a Bible, candles, rosaries, holy statues/icons, crosses, flowers, prayer cards/booklets, dried out palms, from last Palm Sunday,white candle, etc. If you don't have many items, it's fun to make them, too!

Involve the Kids - Make a rosary, plant a potted Easter garden, create Resurrection Eggs, craft a crucifix or cross, colour pictures, use blocks of lego to build stages for the elements. Add a pillow for kneeling, and that's it - you're good to go! Your home altar can stay year round - changing the elements as the liturgical seasons change: Easter (white), Ordinary Time (green), Lent/Advent (purple or violet).



Following the news that the coronavirus is affecting an increasing number of people worldwide, members of the public have been urged to wash their hands frequently and thoroughly.

The direction from health authorities is to wash your hands with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds, roughly the same amount of time it takes to pray one "Hail Mary" – double the goodness!

Easter Sermon of Saint John Chrysostom, Archbishop of Constantinople

"Let every pious and God-loving soul enjoy this splendid and luminous feast; let every faithful servant enter joyfully into his Master's joy! Let the one who has borne the burden of fasting now receive his pay, and the one who has toiled since the first hour, let him obtain his due reward! ... If there is one who waited until the ninth hour. let him come unhesitatingly....For the Lord is generous and receives the last even as the first: He gives rest to the worker of the last hour even as to the one of the first. He has pity on the last, and services the first; he rewards the first, and gives freely to the last. He receives the fruits of labour, and accepts good intentions; he honours the deed and praises the effort.

And so, enter into your Master's joy: you the first and you the last will receive the bounty. Come together, you rich and you poor; abstinent, honour this day. You who have kept the fast and you who have not, be joyful now: the table is laden, take of it all of you without any scruple. There is enough of the fatted calf for all: let no one go away hungry. All of you, come and taste the banquet of faith; all of your enjoy the abundance of mercy....

O death, where is your sting? Abyss, where is your victory? Christ is risen, and you are cast down; Christ is risen, and the demons are crushed; Christ is risen, and the angels sing for joy; Christ is risen, and life has overcome; Christ is risen, and the tomb is emptied of the dead: for Christ the Resurrection has become the first-fruits of the dead. To Him be glory and power forever. Amen"





Sr. Margaret "Peggy" MacFarlane 1932-2020

MacFarlane, Sister Margaret "Peggy", formally Sister Ian Marie, 88, a Sister of St. Martha of Antigonish, died at Mary's Court, Parkland Antigonish on Saturday, April 11, 2020 in the 66th year of her Religious Life. Her death is not related to COVID-19.

Born in Upper Margaree, Nova Scotia, Sr. Margaret was the daughter of the late John Archie and Alice (McDaniel) MacFarlane.

Sister Margaret entered the Sisters of St. Martha on August 15, 1952. She pronounced her first vows on August 15, 1954 and her perpetual vows on August 15, 1957. Sr. Margaret spent almost half of her religious life in the field of education, having obtained a teaching diploma from the Normal College, Truro in 1956. She continued her own education with a BA from the University of British Columbia, and BEd from St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish in 1970. Sr. Margaret taught in several communities in which the Congregation was present. In Nova Scotia she taught in St. Andrew's; St. Margaret's Bay, CB; Ingonish, CB; Dingwall, CB. In British Columbia she taught in Kamloops. She also served as principal in Kamloops and Ingonish. Following her time as a teacher she moved into Catechetical Education in Dominion, CB before serving in the ministry of Spirituality. She was as a trusted Spiritual Director and facilitator of Retreats and programs. Martha Retreat Centre in Lethbridge, AB., was among the many communities in which she served in this ministry.

Within the congregation Sr. Margaret served as the first Director of Martha Associates; Director of First Commitment; Director of Ongoing Formation; Assistant Congregation Leader. She also served as local superior in several of the local Communities in which she lived. She also put her love of history into practice as Oral Historian for the Congregation.

A woman of deep wisdom, Sr. Margaret was a trusted confidant to many. Her laughter was contagious, and she loved a good game of cards and was always up for adventure. She held the cares of the world deeply in her heart, and valued above all her relationships with God, her Martha Sisters, and her family with an abiding love for each.

Besides her parents, Sister Margaret was predeceased by two brothers, Harold and Gerald. She is survived by her brother James "Jim" and his wife Shirley, and her sister, Sr. Mary MacFarlane, CSM. She was devoted to her many nieces and nephews, and they to her.

The burial will take place in the private cemetery of the Sisters of St. Martha following the recommendations and procedures required during this time of COVID-19.

A Memorial Mass, and celebration of her life will be held at a later date once the doors to Parkland Antigonish can be open to guests.

Sisters of St. Ann Honoured for Legacy of Education, Health Care



On Feb 14, 2020, the Sisters of St. Ann were honoured for their incredible contributions to Catholic education in the province by the Catholic Independent Schools of British Columbia

The Sisters, who have devoted lifetimes of service in education, nursing, and social justice in our province, received the first annual Sisters of St. Ann Award at the Catholic Educators Conference where they were praised for their historic efforts.

"It's very humbling for us to receive this, as those here are receiving an award on behalf of all those who have gone before us," Sister Marie Zarowny said before accepting the award with several other Sisters from the Catholic Independent Schools Committee of B.C.

The Sisters of St. Ann were founded in Vaudreuil, Que., in 1850 with the mission of providing quality education to poor children. They arrived in Victoria in 1858 at the request of Bishop Modeste Demers and opened the province's first Catholic school. Over the next century and a half, they opened 10 hospitals and more than 30 schools across B.C. and Alaska, while also running social justice initiatives including reconciliation efforts with First Nations, raising awareness about domestic abuse and human trafficking, and caring for creation.

In our Diocese, the Sisters founded St. Ann's Academy in Kamloops, which opened in 1880 and is celebrating 140 years in 2020. The school holds the honour of being the longest continually operating school in B.C. The Sisters also served faithfully in St. James School in Vernon, for many, many years as teachers. Thus, it was both an honor and a blessing for CISKD representatives, Fr. Derrick Cameron (Bishop's Representative), SAA Principal Patrick Niwa, and CISKD Superintendent of Schools Holly Paluck, to attend the awards and reception that honoured the Sisters of St. Ann for their legacy.

"Those who were in BC in the 1800s and the early 1900s would have no idea that what they were doing would have this lasting effect," said Sister Zarowny. Organizers said the award was created to recognize a group or person whose exceptional leadership, commitment, and vision advance Catholic education in B.C., making it fitting to name it for an order of sisters who were teaching before Canada was a country.

These dedicated, welleducated women of service managed to own and operate Catholic schools across the Pacific Northwest without public funding from the Ministry of Education. The Sisters were astute businesswomen, acquiring land in the region that would be used for schools and healthcare centres, all while they were working full-time as principals, teachers, and healthcare professionals."

The Sisters' days of opening new schools and hospitals are now behind them. There are only 25 left living in the province – all in Victoria – with a median age of 86. Lately, they have been wrapping up their work by selling their properties and making donations to worthy organizations who can carry on their mission.

Sizable donations have gone to St. Mark's College in Vancouver, St. Paul's University in Ottawa, and the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace.

The Sisters also have a strong relationship with the Victoria Foundation and various non-profits in the city that support affordable

housing, reconciliation, food security, and help for vulnerable people including those with drug addiction or fleeing domestic violence.

Sister Zarowny said she has come to realize that the Sisters can leave the schools behind, but not the Order's heart for education. "Whether we're involved in social justice or responding to needs for housing or the environment, there has always been an educational component. That taps into our educational charism." As the award shall be given to a different group or individual each year, Sister Zarowny said she's grateful it will continue to recognize the Order's efforts. "The work of the Sisters over these 162 years will be remembered, in perpetuity."

May God continue to bless the Sisters of St. Ann as they have been an extraordinary blessing to our Diocese and province!
